Camels in Australia**Paragraph one**

There are around 14 million camels in the world and many of these live in different countries in Asia and Africa. However, it is not the number of camels there are in the world that is surprising, but the number in Australia – 750,000 in total. They are not in zoos or farms, but are in fact **wild** camels. They live in various parts of the country and move around in search of food.

Paragraph two

C (Example). Many of them came from India, Afghanistan and Saudi Arabia. Shortly after the invention of the motor engine, people did not need camels. Machines **replaced** the camels so their owners released them into the wild.

3...... They can drink up to seven litres of water a day, which is very **practical** for life in the desert. Another thing that helps them to live in these very difficult conditions is their eyelids. They have two sets, which stop the dust and sand entering their eyes. These animals have adapted really well to where they live.

Paragraph C

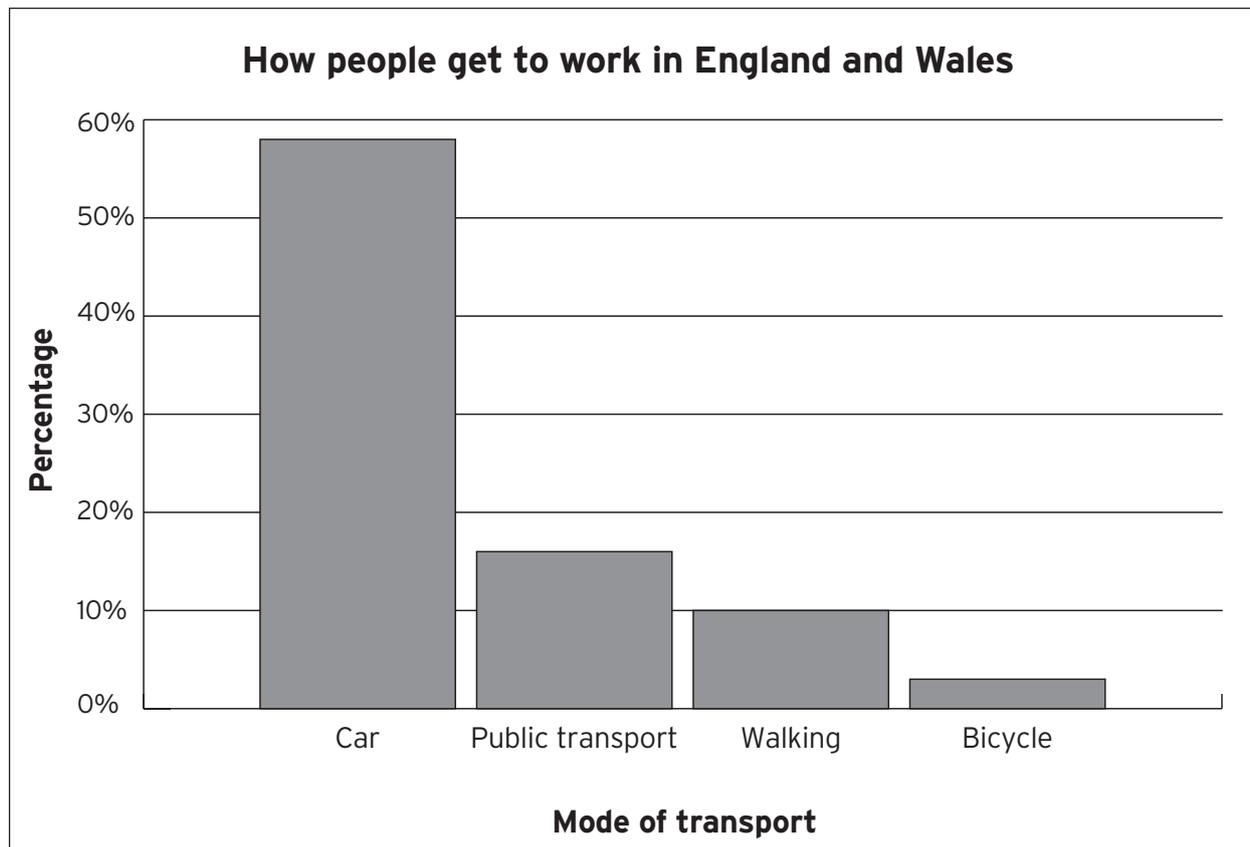
